- Reports of research on families and individuals with a Florida connection including documented sources for all facts that are not common knowledge
- Case studies that show how to solve a genealogical problem with a Florida connection, including documented sources
- Articles about Florida ancestors and their interesting life stories, including documented sources
- Instructional articles on how to find genealogical sources, how to follow sound research practices, and how to research in unusual or under-used resources
- Articles about trips to Florida ancestral sites
- Transcriptions of records of interest to Florida researchers
- Updates on genealogically significant projects going on in Florida
- Reviews of genealogy books, websites, or software

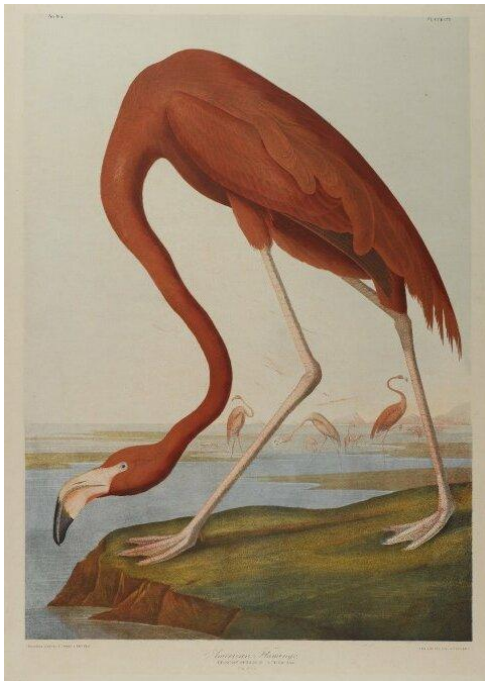

Northerners and Florida: Find Your Sun-Loving Ancestors

People began visiting Florida for leisure pursuits like hunting, fishing, bird watching, and photography before the Civil War.¹ Naturalists like John and William Bartram of Philadelphia had visited Florida in the 1700s and written accounts of its natural wonders. Illustrations showing odd birds like flamingos² and frightening creatures like alligators prompted the adventurous to want to see for themselves the lush scenery and strange creatures of Florida.



Florida tourism really began to take off after the Civil War with improved travel by steamboat and railway. Real estate developers turned their attention to the state, the penny postcard allowed people in areas far from Florida to see what sights awaited them if they traveled there. Newspapers and magazines printed photos of Florida scenes.

In *Speedway to Sunshine: The Story of the Florida East Coast Railway*, Seth Bramson tells us this about post-Civil War travel to the Sunshine State: “As the effects of the Civil War gradually wore away, an increasing number of winter visitors began venturing south to Jacksonville and nearby St. Augustine. Picturesque river steamers plied up and down the St. Johns River, along the banks of which there grew a number of small towns and resorts. But travel to Florida was difficult. To reach Jacksonville by train from the North and Mid-West, involved many changes and delays due to the different gauges of the railroads. Three or four days were required to make the trip by railroad from New York, and many

preferred to take the coastal steamers to Charleston or Savannah, and then change to railroad or a smaller steamer for the trip to Jacksonville.”³ But as time went on, steamers went all the way from New York to Fernandina, one of the first tourist towns of northern Florida.

As with many areas in the US, “early tourism had centered on ‘health retreats,’ based on a belief that the fresh water and air of rural Florida could heal ‘urban’ ailments like tuberculosis. However, as steamships opened the relatively undeveloped interior of the state up to recreation, Florida’s attraction for tourists grew.... [S]teamships allowed for regular movement through inland waterways, particularly the St. John’s River.... [This] helped establish Jacksonville and

Fernandina as preferred gateways into the rest of the state.”⁴

Wealthy people from the north built huge winter homes along the St. John’s River and developers built luxury hotels to accommodate tourists along the river. The Florida Keys were also a popular destination. Railroad routes proliferated, making travel easier.⁵



With the rise of commercial airlines, many more of our ancestors found an easy way to spend their winters—or at least part of them—in the Florida sunshine. Of course, not all of our ancestors could afford plane tickets and luxury hotels, so the rise of accommodations for tourists

traveling by automobile made visiting Florida possible for more people. The interstate highway system and motels made it even easier for our middle-class ancestors to take vacations from the northern winter.

While well-off northerners learned to consider Florida their playground, many ordinary people from the north were introduced to the subtropical climate of the state through military service. There are and have been many military installations in Florida.

Union soldiers ended up in Florida during and after the Civil War. Florida had homestead land available as a result of the Homestead of 1862, so a northern ancestor who had a taste of the climate might have returned after the war to homestead.

In 1898, during the Spanish-American War, the 2nd New York Regiment was stationed in Tampa before shipping out to Cuba. The war ended before they could be deployed, but these soldiers got a taste of Florida living.

During World War I, more military installations were opened in Florida, giving more of our northern ancestors exposure to life without snow. This is a panoramic photo of the men stationed at Camp Joseph E. Johnston in Jacksonville in March 1918.⁶ We can see their barracks and administrative buildings in the background. This was a training facility for the Quartermaster Corps.



But it was World War II that changed Florida forever. “Over the course of four years, Florida grew from a small, mostly rural and agricultural state into a massive industrial and training area preparing men and material for war. Instead of tourists, Florida was soon filled with recruits. Many of these servicemen and women returned to the Sunshine State when the war was over.... By 1942, Florida had over 172 military installations, ranging from relatively small specialty camps to extremely large bases.”⁷

A Women’s Army Auxiliary Corps (later Women’s Army Corps) training center opened in Daytona Beach in October 1942, giving many women from the north the same experience their

brothers in arms had of experiencing Florida life.⁸



Newspapers played an important role in fueling our ancestors' love affair with Florida, and newspapers are also a good source of information for us on our sun-loving ancestors. We can find them mentioned by name in articles, and we can find details about their life in Florida by looking at ads in historic newspapers.

On Sunday, 2 January 1916, the *New York Sun* ran an eight-page "Winter Resort Supplement" devoted to what they called "Winter Touring in America." What they really meant was winter touring in Florida.⁹

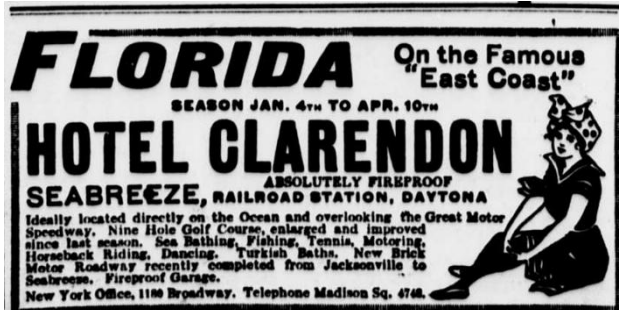

Would we rather be holed up in our house or apartment with snow blowing outside or here among the palm trees enjoying life outside in the fresh air at the Ormond Resort in Ormond Beach?

The supplement contained ads like this one for the Seaboard Airline Railway offering to take you from New York to Florida with "liberal stopover privileges allowed." We can get more information and buy our tickets at 1184 Broadway.

We find another indication of the popularity of Florida with our New York ancestors in this ad for the Hotel Clarendon near Jacksonville. This hotel has a New York office at 1180 Broadway, along with a New York phone number, Madison Square 4748. That's almost as convenient as the internet, right?

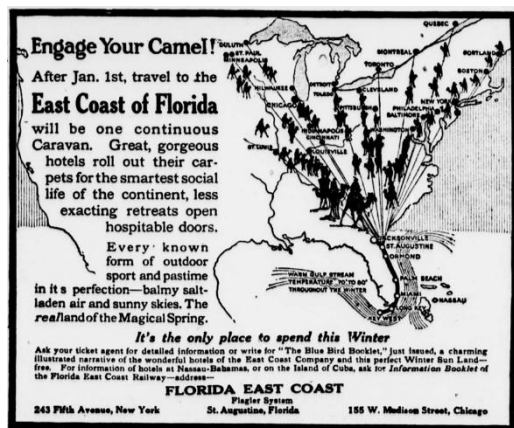


We learn that the Hotel Clarendon (“absolutely fireproof”) in Seabreeze, is “ideally located directly on the Ocean and overlooking the Great Motor Speedway, Nine Hole Golf Course, enlarged and improved since last season.”

And just to show they were telling the truth, here is a photo from about 1911 showing the Hotel Clarendon with flags flying.¹⁰



One of the headlines says Florida is benefiting from the fact that so-called globetrotters have to stay on this side of the world now because of the war in Europe. And even if our ancestors couldn’t afford to be a globe-trotter or stay at a resort, a spread like this can plant the idea of Florida as a place they long to live.



This is an attempt at being humorous by the Florida East Coast Railway company. They want you to engage your camel because after January first there’s just one continuous caravan from the frozen north down to sunny Florida, where you can enjoy every known form of outdoor sport and pastime in balmy salt-laden air and under sunny skies. And we see down at the bottom that the Florida East Coast Railway has offices in both New York and Chicago, making it easy to travel to Florida from all over the north.

As they are today, winter visitors were an economic engine for Florida's tourist areas, so their comings and goings were often reported in the local newspaper.¹¹

Newspapers from the 1870s up through the 1950s can tell us about our northern ancestors arriving and departing, as well as their activities, both benevolent and nefarious, while they were visiting in Florida.¹²

New York Visitors Entertained

Mr. and Mrs. Renia Saunders and daughter, Jesselyn McLeod, entertained Mr. and Mrs. Eustin Barker of New York City, the former Earnestine Sands, with a buffet supper at their new home, 14860 Tyler street in Richmond Heights this week. Other guests were Mr. and Mrs. Grant Waterman, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Bethel, Mrs. Learline Edyth, Mrs. Clotell Albury. Beautiful gifts were received. An enjoyable evening was spent by all.

Newspapers are also full of ads for schemes for selling land in Florida to northerners.¹³ If your ancestor purchased land in Florida in the 20th century, it could be as a result of one of these ads.

This ad is from the Daytona paper in 1916 inviting home seekers and especially northern people to visit Wilbur by the Sea

on the Halifax peninsula for the greatest bargains in Florida. They have hard shell streets all over the property so you can drive your auto anywhere. They offer five, six, and seven room bungalows with all the modern conveniences and tasteful furnishings. There's ocean frontage as well as frontage on the Halifax River. There's an onsite restaurant that serves meals at all hours. There's bus service to Daytona. If you're loving your Florida vacation, you can own a home down here. So, I think we can see that newspapers are a wonderful way to discover our ancestors' connections to Florida. But there are others.

Sometimes our northern ancestors died while on a visit to Florida, so we will find Florida death certificates for them. This certificate is for Mrs. Bertha Abeles who died of an apparent heart attack at the Park Hotel in Jacksonville, Florida, on the 20th of November 1925 at the age of 60.

The authorities make it clear with that stamp at the top that Bertha is a non-resident of Duval County Florida. We can see that she died at the Park Hotel. Her usual residence is 205 Hogan Street in New York City. And down at the bottom we see that her place of burial is going to be New York City and that her body was shipped for burial on 21 November.¹⁴

Sometimes we can find published accounts of

travel in Florida by early visitors, like *A Trip through Northern and Central Florida, During March and April, 1882*, by Frank Simpson. It has been digitized by the Library of Congress (<https://www.loc.gov/resource/gdcmassbookdig.tripthroughnorthoosimp/>). Even if they don't mention our ancestors, they can give us insight into what their visit to Florida would have been like.



On the Florida Memory website, we can find a variety of digitized resources for our northern ancestors in Florida, like these three privates of the 513th Base Squadron at Sarasota Army Air Field.¹⁵

These are just a few of the many resources for learning about our northern ancestors and their love affair with Florida.

Combs & Walker: Florida Pioneer Biographies

George Combs (1816–1894)

George Combs was born 11 April 1816, according to his pension application, and his birthplace was listed as East Florida. However, his father, John Combs, a native of South Carolina, in 1820 was enumerated in Camden County, Georgia. By 1830, the census showed that John Combs and his family were living in Hamilton County, Florida. George married Mary Ellerby (1815-1854) (spelled Ellisby on the marriage record) on 27 July 1836 in Columbia County, Florida.

George and Mary had the following children:

- i. Martha Combs (1836–1920), married James Long (1828–1894).
- ii. Jane Combs (1841–1920), married (1) Elias Williams (1836–1909) and (2) John Reynolds Herndon (1834–1905).
- iii. Mary Eliza Combs (1843–1871), married John Issac “Jack/Jasper” Harvey (1835–1915).
- iv. John Richard Combs (1844–1929), married (1) Sarah Dorman (1846–1897) and (2) Mary Ella Thompson (1875–1932).
- v. James Combs (1846–1921), married (1) Martha Caroline Harvey (1846–1895) and (2) Piety Ann (Dortch) Chastain (1871–1944), widow of Alison W. Chastain (1859–1895).
- vi. William B. Combs (1847–bef. 1860), never married.
- vii. George Jackson Combs (1850–1914), married (1) Lucinda Cason (1853–1893) and (2) Amanda Louise Raulerson (1859–1969).
- viii. Sarah Combs (1851–1932), married David Jackson Dugger (1850–1926).
- ix. Ellen Combs (1854–bet. 1870-1880), never married.

The 1840 census lists George Combs back in Camden County, Georgia. However, he did not stay there for long. In his Indian War pension application, he stated he lived for two years in Charlton County (which until 1854 was part of Camden County), then moved back to Florida. George Combs voted in Florida's first statewide election on 26 May 1845 at the North Prong St. Mary's Precinct in Columbia County, Florida.

The area where he lived later became New River County, Florida, and after that became Baker County, Florida in 1861. He was enumerated in the 1850 Florida census for Columbia County. In the 1860 census, he was listed in New River, and in the 1870 census and the censuses until his death, he was listed in Baker County, Florida.

Mary (Ellerby) Combs died 6 June 1854 in Columbia County, Florida according to George's Indian War pension application papers. She is thought to be buried at Cedar Creek Cemetery located in Baker County, Florida, in an unmarked grave. George married Martha M. Raulerson 15 April 1857 in Columbia County, Florida. She was the daughter of Herod Raulerson and Nancy Gibson. There were no children from the marriage of George and Martha. However, she raised the children from George's first marriage.

During the Second Seminole Indian War George enlisted as a private in Warren's First Florida Militia under Captain North and Captain Haddock. He appears to have served in several military units from 1836 to 1840. He applied for a pension based on his Indian War Service. After his death, his wife Martha applied for a widow's pension, which was granted. She received this pension until her death in 1911.

George owned a successful farm that he referred to in his will as his "plantation" in Baker County, Florida. During the 1860's he owned three slaves, one male age 54, one female age 40, and one male age 11. Also, during the Civil War, in 1863 he provided 60 gallons of syrup to the Confederate States and was paid \$270.00 dollars. After the Civil War, he continued his farming operations where he raised corn, sugar/syrup, cattle, and hogs.

George and his family were members of the Cedar Creek Primitive Baptist Church. He had been a messenger at one time from Cedar Creek Primitive Baptist Church to Providence Primitive Baptist Church according to its church minutes.

George died 3 November 1894. He was buried at Cedar Creek Cemetery, in Baker County near Sanderson, Florida. His grave is marked and his epitaph states, "I have fought a good fight. I have finished my course. I have kept the faith."

His will was probated in Baker County, Florida, in which he provided for his wife Martha and his surviving children. He left Martha the homeplace, all outbuildings, fodder, certain cows, hogs, his buggy and cart, a black mare named Mittie, his sugar mill and boilers, along with his rifle and a double barrel shotgun called "Dubster."

Martha did not remarry after George's death. She remained at the homeplace until her death on April 26, 1911. She was buried by her husband at Cedar Creek Cemetery. Her epitaph reads, "Who brought me hither will bring me home. No other guide I seek."

Before her death, Martha deeded inherited lands from George to her stepchildren by quit claim deeds on file at the courthouse in Baker County, Florida, in 1904.

George and his wives were early pioneers in what would become the State of Florida. His descendants from his first wife, Mary, still live in North Florida and throughout the state.

James Combs (1846–1921)

James Combs was born 16 April 1846 in Columbia County, Florida. He was the son of George Combs (1816–1894) and Mary (Ellerby) Combs (1814-1854). Over the years, Florida's changing county boundaries placed him and his parents first in New River County, and in 1861 in Baker County.

In 1864, James married Martha Caroline Harvey (1846–1895), daughter of Richard Harvey (1820–1904) and Elizabeth Long (1820–1899). James and Martha had eleven children, all born in Baker County:

- i. James Combs, Jr. (1865–1939), married Martha Dowling (1868–1956).
- ii. Jane Elizabeth Combs (1867–1949), married Joseph S. "Joe" Johns (1867–1929).
- iii. Mary Lougenia "Lou" Combs (1869–1933), married William Kell Prevatt (1856–1939).
- iv. Lillie Mae Combs (1870–1933), married (1) James Henry Crews (1867–1903) and (2) Thomas Lewis Cox/Coxe (1848–1918).
- v. Georgia Ellen Combs (1872–1855), married Charles Phillip Pfeiffer (1874–1929).
- vi. Martha Caroline Combs (1875-1902), married William Carroll Thompson (1866–1933).
- vii. Eliza Betsy "Bealie" Combs (1877–1923), married Hardy Franklin Tyre (1878–1967).
- viii. Jessie Anna Combs (1878–1960), married Jesse Judson Dortch (1877–1937).
- ix. Johnnie Combs (1880–1881).
- x. Ida A. Combs (1882–1951), married (1) William Joshua Hogan (1875–1901) and (2) George Washington Plummer (1853–1914).
- xi. George Lonnie Combs (1884-1961), married Courtney Williams (1889–1961).

Martha Caroline (Harvey) Combs died 30 October 1895. According to her obituary, published in the *Florida Times Union*, she had been in poor health for twelve years before her death. The obituary stated that she took a chill that developed into a fever and her condition worsened until her death. She was buried at Cedar Creek Cemetery, near Sanderson in Baker County. Her epitaph states, "A devoted wife and faithful mother."

After the death of his first wife, James married Piety Ann (Dortch) Chastain (1871–1944), the widow of Alison W. Chastain (1859–1895) on 30 December 1896 in Columbia County, Florida. She was the daughter of David Jackson Dortch (1818–1880) and Mary Cox (1835–1910). She

was also the sister of Jesse Judson Dortch who married Jessie Anna Combs in 1898. Piety had one daughter from her previous marriage to Alison W. Chastain, Katie Belle Chastain (1887–1961), who married Emantha E. Roberts (1882–1970).

James and Piety Ann had six children:

- xii. Alma J. Combs (1897–1985), married Bishop Cleveland Jones (1892–1974).
- xiii. Roe David Combs (1899–1982), married (1) I'Dora Gilley (1897–1954) and (2) Hester Jane Patterson (1919-1996).
- xiv. Gladys Mary Combs (1902–1991), married (1) Guy Leo Dunn (1902–1925) and (2) James Thomas Gillis (1904–1993).
- xv. Claude Hubert Combs (1905–1994), married (1) Edith Louise Kinard (1908–1954) and (2) Mary Edna (Tedder) Henley (1907–2007), widow of James Monroe Henley (1902–1953).
- xvi. Annie Mae Combs (1907–1988), married (1) Joseph Price Perry (1881–1963) and (2) Simuel Eston Wester (1895–1985).

xvii. Felton Corine Combs (1910–1961), married Robert Oliver Coats Houston (1901–1987).

James was a Confederate soldier, enlisting 16 October 1861 in Company D, 1st Florida Cavalry at Sanderson, Florida, as a private. He later served as a corporal and second lieutenant, Company G, 1st (Reserves) Florida Infantry. He surrendered at the end of the war and was paroled at Madison, Florida, 20 May 1865. Later in life he was granted a Confederate pension by the state of Florida on 31 August 1909.

His son, Claude Combs, related that his father told him that during the war he and his fellow soldiers slept one night in a cotton field in South Carolina between the rows of cotton plants, and when he awoke in the morning, he was covered with snow. He contracted pneumonia but recovered. On another occasion, James recounted that he and his comrades came upon an abandoned home in South Carolina that had a little house dog there. Being hungry, the men killed and ate the dog. James told Claude that the dog was some of the best meat he ate during the entire Civil War.

James moved to Columbia County, Florida, south of Lake City, between 1900 and 1910. He deeded his old homeplace in Baker County to his son James Combs, Jr. in 1917.

James died 18 October 1921 at his farm, south of Lake City, of a stroke. His obituary, published in the *Lake City Reporter* stated he was a highly respected citizen, and his funeral was attended by his fifteen surviving children and one hundred and fifty grandchildren and great-grandchildren. He was buried at Bethel Methodist Church Cemetery, south of Lake City.

Piety Ann, after the death of her husband, continued to live at their homeplace in Columbia County. She received a Confederate widow's pension based on her husband's Civil War service until her death, which occurred on 15 July 1944 at Lake City. Her cause of death was typhoid. She was buried by James at Bethel United Methodist Church.

During his lifetime James Combs was a successful farmer, a soldier, and a well-known citizen in Baker County and Columbia County, Florida. He and his two wives left many descendants still living in Baker County, Columbia County, and throughout the State of Florida.

James Walker (1825–1901)

James Walker was born 10 April 1825 in Colleton County, South Carolina. He was the son of Thomas Walker (1796–1864) and Elizabeth "Bettie" Osteen (1799–1885). The 1840 census revealed that James' parents, along with some of his mother's relatives (her brother, James Osteen; her mother, Sarah Osteen; and two brothers-in-law, James T.S. Hall and James Mims) had moved their families to Hamilton County, Florida.

James Walker married, abt. 1844, Rachel Eliza Sistrunk (1812–1880), daughter of David Sistrunk (1870–1853) and Klorina (1785–abt. 1845), maiden name unknown. By 1845 James Walker, brother-in-law James Osteen, and father-in-law David Sistrunk were living in Madison County, Florida, where they voted in the first statewide election at Precinct 1: More's Bluff.

James Walker and Rachel Eliza Sistrunk had the following children:

- i. James Isham Walker (1845–?), marriage information unknown.
- ii. Martha Walker (1849–1886), married Alexander Hatch (1853–1899)
- iii. Thomas J. Walker (1851–1910), married Elizabeth “Lizzie” Smith (1854–1910)

James appears in the 1850 census for Madison County, Florida. In 1860, he was living in the new county of Lafayette, which was created from Madison County. He would remain a resident of Lafayette County for the rest of his life.

James claimed to have fought in the Second Seminole War as a substitute for his father, Thomas Walker. He applied for a government pension, which was denied because the rolls for the company he stated he served in did not list him, but listed only his father.

He did enlist at Madison, Florida, and served in the Confederate Army as a private in Company E, 11th Regiment, Florida Infantry. He was captured 6 April 1865 and signed an oath of allegiance on 24 June 1865 at Newport News, Virginia. After his release, he returned to his home in Lafayette County.

Around 1865, James took in an orphaned girl, Mary Armstrong (1856–1922), and she lived with his family and worked in the household as a servant, as shown in the 1870 census. Sometime later in the 1870’s James started a more personal relationship with Mary. It was

also known that during this time, his wife became ill and died in 1880. After the death of his first wife, James and Mary married on 24 November 1881 in Lafayette County.

They had the following children (the first three were born before their marriage):

- iv. William Clayton Walker (1874–1953), married Sarah Caldonia Sparrow (1880–1958).
- v. Albert James Walker (1876–1960), married (1) Lettie Rooks (1880–1910) and (2) Ida Dobson (1883–1966).
- vi. Lewis Winters Walker (1877–1968), married (1) Susan Frances “Susie” Whisnet (1891–1912) and (2) Nita Lucille Brown (1900–1991).
- vii. Mary Lougenia Walker (1883–1936), married Melous E. Dees (1879–1952).
- viii. James Jefferson Walker (1885–1956), married (1) Maude Dempsey (1886–1923) and (2) Lucille Hicks (1908–1991).
- ix. Fannie Gertrude Walker (1889–1985), married William Claude Dempsey (1885–1948).
- x. Alice Viola Walker (1890–1908), never married.
- xi. Samuel Pasco Walker (1895–1915), never married.

xii. Ollie Ruby Walker (1896–1972), married Grover C. McCray (1888-1963).

James lived near Midway in Lafayette County. He was instrumental in donating land for the Midway Baptist Church and Church Cemetery. On one occasion in the Midway Baptist Church minutes of March 18, 1892, James was brought up on charges of working on the sabbath, cleaning up trash in his garden, by his son-in-law Alexander Hatch and Mr. W. A. Jackson. James admitted giving his wife a match to fire a log in his field and asked had he done wrong. The church dismissed the charges.

James was a farmer. On the 1860 agriculture census of Lafayette County, he had 600 acres of land valued at \$3000, farm implements valued at \$150, and livestock valued at \$1,200.

James left a will written in 1896. He gave three of his daughters, Mary Lougenia, Ollie, and Fannie, each 40 acres of land and gave his daughter Alice 80 acres of land. He gave his seven grandchildren by his daughter Martha Hatch five dollars each. He and his wife gave his sons lands as well, in a deed instrument that was separate from the will. He gave Albert, James Jefferson, and Samuel Pasco each eighty acres of land, and he gave William Clayton, Lewis Winters, and Thomas J. each 60 acres of land. He left the remainder of his property to his wife, as long as she properly maintained and educated his minor children. His sons Thomas J. and William Clayton were the executors of his estate. The son James Isham Walker was not mentioned or left anything by his father, there being some sort of estrangement between them. Martha (Walker) Hatch had died in 1886, which is why her portion of the estate was left to her children and not to her husband.

James died on the 27 October 1901 at his home in Lafayette County. He was buried in the Midway Baptist Church Cemetery where his mother Elizabeth (Osteen) Walker and several of his siblings are buried. It is not known where James Walker's first wife, Rachel Eliza (Sistrunk) Walker, is buried. Mary (Armstrong) Walker died at home in Lafayette County on 2 August 1922. She was buried by her husband at Midway Baptist Church Cemetery.

James Walker was a Florida pioneer, Confederate soldier, farmer, and member of the Baptist Church. His family bible is currently in possession of John Albert Burnett, his great-great-grandson. James and his wives have left numerous descendants who still enjoy the benefits of his settlement in the State of Florida.



John Albert Burnett (b. 1961) has been involved with genealogical research since the 1976 U.S. Bicentennial celebration and after watching the TV miniseries *Roots*. This started a fantastic journey that has crossed generations and the country. He completed his PhD in history from Florida State University in 2001.

McRae: Florida Pioneer Biographies

Daniel McRae (1817–1911)

Daniel McRae was born 11 January 1817, probably in Bulloch County, Georgia. His family had come from Scotland many years before he was born. Sarah Livingston was born about 12 October 1821 in Georgia. Sarah and Daniel married on 9 August 1835 in Telfair, Georgia. Their oldest children were born in Telfair:

- i. Mary Ann Grace, born 1837
- ii. Norman Harlow, born 1840
- iii. Barnabas Marshall, born 1842
- iv. Altha Jane, born 1844 and died in childhood

In 1847, Daniel and Sarah moved to the Black Creek District in Duval County, Florida. Daniel was an overseer. In 1867, they moved to Starke in Bradford County, Florida. In the 1870 census, Daniel's occupation was listed as a carpenter.

Daniel and Sarah had many more children after they moved to Florida.

- v. George D. P., born 1848
- vi. Christopher Columbus, born 1850
- vii. Joseph Clinton, born 1852
- viii. Cornelia Amelia, born 1855
- ix. Sarah Katherine, born 1858
- x. Philip Antonio, born 1859
- xi. Arthur Duncan, born 1863
- xii. Daniel Reid, born 1863

Arthur Duncan and Daniel Reid were twins.

Daniel worked as a carpenter until he was about 80 years old. When Sarah died in 1901, Daniel went to live with his daughter, Mary Ann Grace (McRae) Dillaberry, who also lived in Starke. When Daniel died on May 28, 1911, at 94 years old, a long obituary was published in the *Bradford Telegraph* newspaper. It said he was the “oldest citizen of this section of the country.” He was well respected, as shown in his obituary. It said, “He followed the golden rule and nobody was ever known to speak of him but in praise. He and his wife were a loving pair as long as they were allowed to live together and they took great pains to guide their children to the right path through life.”

Daniel and Sarah are buried in the Crosby Lake Cemetery in Bradford County. They share a tombstone and are buried head to head. Family stories say this is because it was a family custom in Scotland.

Barnabas Marshall McRae (1842–1914)

Barnabus Marshall McRae was born in July 1842 in Georgia. He went by the name of “Barney”. He was the third child of Daniel and Sarah (Livingston) McRae. The family moved to the Black Creek District in Duval County, Florida, in 1847.

Barney enlisted as a private on 28 October 1861 in Magnolia, Florida. He was in Company C, First Florida Calvary, under Captain John A. Summerlin. His brother, Norman, served with him in the same company. Barney was paid an additional \$12 per month for the use of his horse. The First Florida Cavalry served in Florida until the spring of 1862, when it was ordered to Chattanooga, Tennessee. His company became dismounted cavalry and served for the rest of the War as the “First Florida Cavalry, Dismounted.”

At the Battle of Missionary Ridge, Tennessee, he was captured and imprisoned on 25 November 1864. After the war, he returned to Florida.

Barney married Louise Tarratas about 1866. Louise’s parents were William and Hester (Ridaught) Tarratas. Louise was born in 1844 in Florida.

In 1866, Barney was elected to the office of county clerk in Clay County. While he served in that position, there was a scandal involving missing records. He was found not guilty at trial.

Shortly after this, the family moved to Bradford County, Florida. Barney was a carpenter and built many of the older houses in the city of Starke. Barney and Louise lived near Crosby Lake, where Barney built their house.

Barney and Louise had 8 children:

- i. William Daniel
- ii. Harley Matthew
- iii. Michael Joseph
- iv. Mary Ella
- v. Ervin John
- vi. Florence Isola
- vii. Benetta
- viii. Hester Louise

Barney and Louise are buried in the Crosby Lake Cemetery in Bradford County. On their tombstones, it says B.M. McRae died on 27 October 1914 and Louise died on 22 October 1908.

Harley Matthew McRae (1871–1959)

Harley Matthew McRae was born 18 November 1871 in Starke, Bradford County, Florida. He was the second child of Barnabus Marshall McRae and Louise (Tarratas) McRae. He married Ardelia Johns 20 May 1900. Ardelia was born 25 October 1885 in Georgia and moved to Florida with her parents. Harley and Ardelia were married at the home of her parents, Reverend David Johns and Winifred (Dyess) Johns.

Harley and Ardelia bought a house and 40 acres near Harley's parents by Crosby Lake in

Bradford County. Harley was a foreman on the Peggy Railroad for several years, then started farming and was a substitute on the local mail route.

The family lived on another farm before Harley built a house near Starke. His son, Owen, lived in the house for many years after his parents died.

Harley and Ardelia had 12 children. Three of them died in childhood: Walter, Ralph, and Lois. Their other children were Louise, Arthur, James Wesley, Basil, Iris, Audrey, Vesta, Owen, and Odessa.

Ardelia wrote about her life and these papers have been handed down through the family.

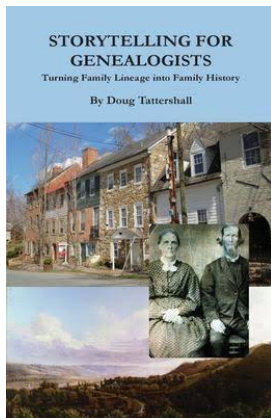

Storytelling for Genealogists: Turning Family Lineage into Family History
By Doug Tattersall

Baltimore: Genealogical Publishing, 2024

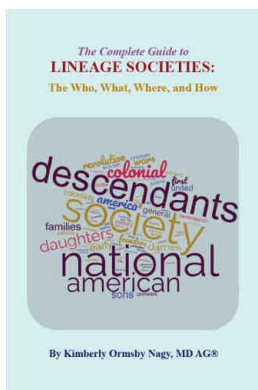
Doug Tattersall wants genealogists to get beyond names, dates, and places and into writing family stories, and he's given us a slim, readable book to help us get there.

He begins with a chapter on how to tell a good story, which is not something that genealogists are necessarily adept at. But storytelling techniques can be learned, and Tattersall shows us how to use the techniques of fiction writing (plot, character, conflict, theme) to

transform our recitation of facts into an engaging narrative while still staying true to the facts of an ancestor's life.

Tattersall points us at resources that help us tell stories, like diaries, letters, and newspaper accounts, even if they don't mention our ancestors. He helps us understand how physical objects like photographs and heirlooms can enrich our storytelling. And he shows us many examples of engaging family history narratives we can emulate.

For anyone who wants to turn facts into stories that will engage their non-genealogist family members, this book is a great starting point.

The author, Kimberly Nagy, has successfully joined over 80 lineage societies and offers a practical guide for us based on extensive experience.

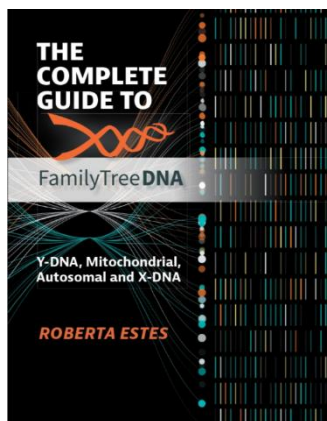
This truly is a "complete guide," beginning with a simple definition ("A Lineage Society is a group of individuals who all descend from a specific group of ancestors."), taking us through all the steps and resources for

applying to a society, and ending with a list of the over 300 lineage societies in the United States today.

Nagy describes what societies do in the current day to serve communities and the nation, how to find a society we might be interested in and for which we might qualify, and how to begin the application process.

She spends considerable time on the process of documenting our lineage to prove eligibility to join a society, helpfully pointing us to sources to prove our lineage and to prove the ancestor's service, occupation, or other qualifying attribute.

If you're interested in applying to a lineage society, this book is an excellent source.



The Complete Guide to FamilyTreeDNA: Y-DNA, Mitochondrial, Autosomal and X-DNA
By Roberta Estes

Roberta Estes is one of the pioneers in the field of genetic genealogy. This book, which she calls both “a reference manual and step-by-step guide,” is an important addition to the field, since FamilyTreeDNA is the only company currently offering DNA testing other than autosomal.

Y-DNA and mitochondrial (mtDNA) tests “can reach far back in time, but are also very informative of recent connections.” Unlike autosomal (atDNA) testing, these tests provide “laser focus.” They “can reach far back in time, but are also very informative of recent connections.... Y-DNA and mitochondrial DNA will both be able to tell you whether **that specific** ancestral line is European, African, Native American, Asian, Jewish, and so forth. Additionally, both tests offer matching at FamilyTreeDNA, information about where other testers' ancestors are found in the world, and more.”

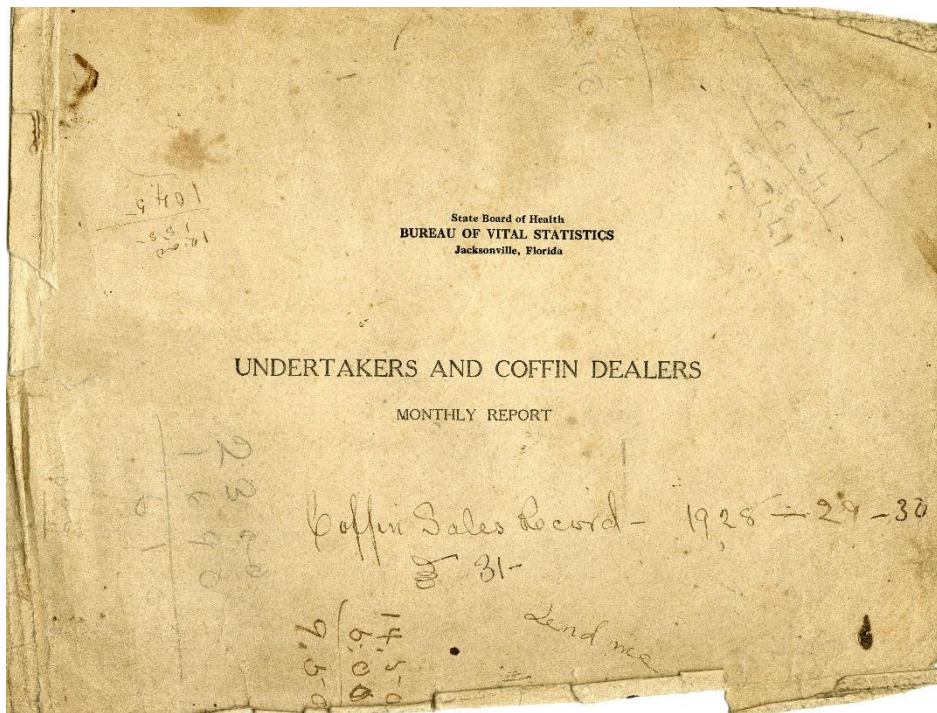
Estes offers help and directions for everything from how to best set up your account settings on FamilyTreeDNA to how to interpret and use test results to how to understand ethnicity estimates.

For anyone who wants to use Y-DNA and mtDNA test results to provide evidence for genealogical conclusions, this is an important reference.
